"The smallest towns keep the biggest secrets" in darkly comic mystery, running March 1-24

CONCORD, MA— February 6, 2024— An evening in Big Cherry – a small town in anywhere USA – and the city council meeting unfolds in real time, unmasking secrets that threaten to undo life as they know it ... and driving the question, "How far would you go?"

Award-winning playwright Tracy Letts' (*August: Osage County*) new play was called one of the most thrilling on Broadway in recent years. Nominated as Best New Play by the Tony Awards and Outer Critics Circle in 2022, and for the Pulitzer Prize in drama, *The Minutes* is part biting comedy, part Hitchockian mystery, and at its dark heart an unflinching allegory about small-town politics and real-world power.

"The play has a completely original and outrageous tone, both funny and dark, located somewhere between *The Office* and *The Twilight Zone*. It's brilliant in the way that it uses comedy to dramatize some serious issues facing our country today," says Scott Edmiston, three-time Elliot Norton Award-winning artist, hailed as "one of Boston's finest directors" by the *Boston Globe*. "It takes a hard look at the growing movement to deny or rewrite some of the unpleasant truths about America's past. What are some of the myths about ourselves and our nation that we find hard to admit -- and why?"

Receiving its Greater Boston Premiere at The Umbrella Arts Center in Concord, a small town itself vigorously interrogating its role in America's foundational myth on the eve of the national semiquincentennial, it's a timely and resonant play that *NY Daily News* calls "important...a visceral theatrical experience about what has happened to retail American democracy and how this nation decides which stories about itself it wants to believe."

"It's incredibly exciting to work with Scott for the first time alongside a remarkably talented and creative team" says Producing Artistic Director Brian Boruta. "The Minutes promises to be a highlight in the season as we use the example of one very small town meeting to ask some very big questions." The cast features some of Boston's busiest and most acclaimed actors including Steven Barkhimer, Jeremiah Kissel, Richard Snee, Julie Perkins and Damon Singletary.
