# Letter from the Director

Dear friends,

Hello and welcome to The Umbrella Stage's production of the musical version of *The Color Purple*.

This is a timeless and epic piece of theater, giving us a snapshot of African American history from the turn of the twentieth century, well into the 1940's. It tells the story of a young African American female raised in rural Georgia, from ages fourteen to forty. Celie faces seemingly insurmountable odds as she tries to survive a world that is hostile and unforgiving to her. She is expected to care for and nurture those who care nothing for her. She is brutalized not only by her stepfather and husband, but also by a society that does not see her as human. That sees her as an ignorant and obstinate possession, a vessel for birthing only to be cast aside at will. Celie loses everything she ever loves, including her own children. Yet, through it all, Celie's indomitable spirit searches unceasingly for the love, both spiritual and physical, that has eluded her. In this search, she brings out the best in all those around her and, in the end, creates the life she has always dreamed of. Her spirit is the spirit of African American women across this nation. Her personal anthem, "I'm Here," cuts to the very core of a society determined to cast aside or render invisible a nation of African American women who helped build this country with strength, sweat, tears, blood, joy, and grace.

Experiencing this story for the first time in Alice Walker's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel, published in 1982, changed the perceptions and the lives of women around the world. Ms. Walker states that she wrote the story because she never knew her grandmother or her great grandmother. Women, she says, who had very sad and difficult lives. She speaks of how much she loved and admired her own mother and that her mother's only joy in life was the garden she created. Over forty years ago, Alice Walker planted a seed in the American psyche called *The Color Purple*. This garden has grown into a global garden lush with compassion and love for all living things, and a deeper understanding of that which connects each and every one of us.

The Umbrella Stage Company's production of this beautiful piece of theater was created as a love letter to the theater because of its intricate patchwork of scenes that form a delicate pattern of love, surrounded by the strength and endurance of the spirit of our African ancestors. It is in the spirit of love that we present this piece. Love of community, love of family and love of the theater.

# Dramaturg's Note

Diversity in the Black Community

There's a common misconception about 'Black shows'. I think we have all come around to the same conclusion, that Black directors and creatives should be at the helm of shows about the Black experience that feature an all, or mostly, Black cast. Yes to this – it's super important. As Black people, there are many common cultural things that we can relate to. But also, the 'Black experience' is not one thing. It is a mistake to believe that there is not diversity within any Black group. Black people are not a monolith.

The Color Purple alone shows us a wide range of Black experience, from powerful women overcoming colorism, sexism and violence, to folks struggling with identity and relationship to Africa, to victims of white supremacy who perpetrate the same violence on other Black people. The characters in *The Color Purple* are as diverse as the actors who are portraying them on stage.

As an Equity, Diversity & Inclusion consultant, I sat down with the cast to engage in discussion about Blackness. Yes, we were all Black – but we all had different stories to share. We all came to *The Color Purple* with different lived experiences. Some felt right at home with characters like the church ladies while others spoke of being ostracized from the church because of their identities. Some had grown up in mostly white communities and had felt forced to assimilate. Some with darker skin spoke of suffering from overt colorism growing up, while others shared their struggles around identity and 'fitting into' Black spaces. Perhaps Blackmembers of our audience can identify with one of these perspectives. Maybe none of them ring true, and that just further proves the vast diversity of experiences of our people.

Though the stereotypes that often come along with Blackness do not define us, Blackness itself is a part of our identity. We all share in the joy, strength and resilience of our people, both in *The Color Purple* and in our lives. This line in 'African Homeland' has always stood out to me:

We walk away from this ravaged land With courage deep in our hearts To face the unknown, together We'll find a place where we can be Where spirit rise and soul is free Our people, my people

Though our paths, challenges and identities as Black people are unique, we are all connected to the African Homeland – whether we remember it or not. Whether our ancestors were stolen or traveled here freely. Across the African diaspora, we all have claim to Blackness, and that ties us together. We celebrate our diversity as proudly as we celebrate the beauty of our people.

Ms. Gonzalez has also worked as an actor for the following theatre companies: American Repertory Theatre, American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco, The San

Francisco Mime Troupe, The Huntington Theatre Company, Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, Denver Theatre Center, Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, LA Women's Shakespeare, and Center Repertory Theatre. At the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Ms. Gonzalez performed such notable roles as Lady Macbeth in Macbeth, Masha in The Three Sisters, Cassandra in Trojan Women, Ariel in The Tempest, and Shen Te/Shui Ta in Good Person of Szechuan. Other plays include, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Uncle Vanya, Restoration, Cymbeline, The Winter's Tale, and Titus Andronicus. Ms. Gonzalez is the recipient of a Citation of Excellence in Theatre Arts from the Massachusetts House of Representatives.

Marsha Norman (Book) won the Pulitzer Prize for her play, 'Night, Mother and a Tony Award for her book of the Broadway musical, The Secret Garden. Ms. Norman is co-chair, with Christopher Durang, of the Playwriting Department of the Juilliard School and vice president of the Dramatists Guild of America. Her other plays include Getting Out, Traveler in the Dark, Sarah and Abraham, Trudy Blue, and Last Dance. Her published work includes Four Plays, Vol. 1: Collected Plays of Marsha Norman and a novel, The Fortune Teller. She has numerous film and TV credits, Grammy and Emmy nominations, and awards from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Rockefeller Foundation, the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters and the Fellowship of Southern Writers. She is a native of Kentucky who lives in New York City and Long Island with her two children.

Brenda Russell (Music & Lyrics) has a unique musical perspective, intimate voice and prolific treasure-trove of lyrics, that prove that a truly glowing talent only deepens with time. Composer of the classics "Get Here," "If Only for One Night," and the Grammy-nominated "Piano in the Dark," Brenda's songwriting prowess and chameleon-like ability to shift between musical genres and combine styles trumpeted ovations in 2005 with the opening of the Tony Award-winning hit Broadway musical The Color Purple, for which she, Allee Willis and Stephen Bray co-wrote the music and lyrics. Brenda and her co-authors were also nominated for a 2007 Grammy in the Best Musical Show Album category for the original cast album.

Allee Willis (Music & Lyrics) is a one-woman creative think-tank. A multi-disciplinary artist and visionary thinker whose range of imagination and productivity knows no bounds, her success exuberantly defies categorization; 'unique' pales as a descriptor. Willis is a Grammy-winning and Emmy- and Tony- nominated composer whose hit songs – including Earth, Wind & Fire's "September" and "Boogie Wonderland," The Pointer Sisters' 'Neutron Dance," Pet Shop Boys with Dusty Springfield's "What Have I Done to Deserve This," and The Rembrandts' "I'll Be There for You (Theme From Friends)" – have sold over 50 million records. In 2006, Willis' songs were also featured in three of the top grossing films of the year, Happy Feet, Night at The Museum and Babel.

Stephen Bray (Music & Lyrics) After beginning music studies with private instruction in Detroit, Bray continued training at Berklee College of Music in Boston, Massachusetts. Working with Madonna, he wrote and produced many of her top-ten recordings, including "Angel," "Into the Groove," "Papa Don't Preach," "True Blue" and "Express Yourself." Performing with Breakfast Club, he earned a Grammy nomination for Best New Artist and a top-ten single. He has composed and produced for multiplatinum artists including The Jets, Gladys Knight and Kylie Minogue. Film and television projects include Beverly Hills Cop II, Who's That Girl?, All About The Benjamins and the theme for PBS's "California Connected." Stephen is developing artists for his Soultone label and looks forward to more musical theater. He would like to thank his daughter Milena for her eternal patience and his family for their continuing support.

**Tree Brock** (Wardrobe Supervisor) is proud to be working with The Umbrella Stage Company again after joining them as Wardrobe Supervisor in *RENT* and *Middleton Heights*. They have previously worked as the costume designer with Hoovey Theatre doing *Witch*, *Marjory Prime*, and *Pillowman*. They were also Costume Designer with *The Christmas Carol* in Waltham. He co-wrote and directed the musical Glimmerings Of Hope, which premiered in New York City and toured Michigan in the spring of 2019. He also directed and choreographed the award-winning musical Henry Box Brown - A Musical Journey, in Edinburgh Scotland in the summer of 2019. During the shutdown in 2020, Brown oversaw the Sol, series at Seacoast Repertory Theatre in Portsmouth, NH, which focused on presenting the narratives of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC). Concurrently, Brown premiered two new plays, Stokley and Martin and Nevaeh's Brother, at Seacoast Repertory Theatre, as well as produced a revival of his play, The Bus Stop, which sold out six times in New York City when it premiered. As a young Afro-Latino boy growing up in Brooklyn, NY, during the early '90s, the theater was an important tool that helped Brown imagine a better world in the midst of the increased violence due to the crack epidemic. He saw that performing arts could facilitate a safe environment, where people felt free enough to express themselves and their social justice views through storytelling on stage. In that spirit, Brown recently founded Theater For The People to provide this same outlet and opportunities for today's youth and adults, especially in cities that either lack diversity or include communities of marginalized people. Brown has been recently awarded a playwrighting residency at Boston Center for the Arts. His most recent play Hear Her Sing for Freedom premiered in January 2023 in Cambridge at the Multicultural Arts Center, where Brown serves as the new Artistic Director.

James Cannon (Sound Designer) is a freelance audio engineer, sound designer, composer, and music producer from Chicago, IL, and currently based in Watertown, MA.
